

Today's Gospel

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white.

Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to Jesus. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his exodus, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem.

Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him.

Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah," but Peter did not know what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone.

And the disciples kept silent and, in those days, told no one any of the things they had seen.

<u>Saint Joseph – March 19</u> Who Was Saint Joseph?

Saint Joseph was the husband of Mary and the earthly father of Jesus, chosen by God to play a vital role in the story of salvation. He lived in Nazareth and worked as a carpenter, coming from the royal lineage of King David.

Known for his deep faith, humility, and obedience to God, Joseph accepted his extraordinary role with courage. When he discovered Mary was pregnant before they came together, he initially planned to divorce her quietly to spare her shame. However, an angel appeared to him in a dream, explaining that the child was conceived by the Holy Spirit. Trusting God, Joseph took Mary as his wife and cared for her and the child Jesus.

Joseph's protective nature is seen when he fled to Egypt with his family after being warned by an angel about King Herod's plan to kill Jesus. He later returned to Nazareth when it was safe, providing a stable and loving home for Mary and Jesus. Throughout demonstrated his life. Joseph unwavering faith and selflessness, putting his family's well-being above his own. He is honored as a model of fatherhood, a faithful protector, and a humble servant of God's plan.


Saint Joseph is celebrated as the patron of fathers, workers, and the universal Church. His life of faith and devotion continues to inspire believers worldwide.

Reflection: The Father in Heaven sent His Son into the world to be born of the Virgin Mary. The Father chose her who was the Immaculate Conception to bear His Son in her womb, bring Him into the world, and raise Him from infancy to adulthood. But the Father also needed to choose a foster father for His divine Son. Of all the men in Israel that He could have chosen, He chose Joseph of Nazareth, a carpenter. Today's solemnity not only honors him, but it also points us to his marital union with the Blessed Virgin Mary and to the effect that that marriage had not only upon him, Mary and Jesus, but also upon us as members of the Body of Christ.

Joseph was likely born in the small town of Bethlehem, where Jesus was also born, but he moved to Nazareth with Mary and Jesus after returning from Egypt in order to keep Jesus safe from Archelaus, the ruler of Judea. Though there are a number of apocryphal writings about him from the first several centuries, nothing is known about him for certain except what is contained in the Gospels. But the Gospels tell us all we need to know about this holy, obedient, and just man, who was given authority over the Son of God and continues to exercise a holy authority over the entire Church.

Saint Joseph was truly the father of Jesus. Of this truth, Saint Augustine writes, "By reason of their faithful marriage, both of them deserve to be called Christ's parents, not only his mother but also his father, who was a parent in the same way that he was the mother's spouse: in mind, not in the flesh."
