Reflection on Easter April 20, 2025

God Is Always at Work:

Easter is the most important feast in the Catholic liturgical calendar, as it celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Through his death and Resurrection, Jesus has triumphed over sin and death, and offers us the hope of new life and salvation.

The readings for Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday remind us of God's goodness, power, and saving work throughout history. From the Creation Story to the Exodus from Egypt, God has been at work, leading his people to freedom and new life. In the Epistle reading, St. Paul exhorts us to die to sin and live for God, emphasizing the importance of baptism and faith in Jesus. And in the Gospel reading, we hear the amazing news of Jesus' Resurrection, which brings hope and new life to all who believe.

A Message of Hope:

This message of hope is especially important in our world today, where there is so much suffering, pain, and despair. We are all touched by the effects of sin and death, whether in our own lives or in the lives of those around us. But the Resurrection of Jesus offers us a way out of this darkness. It reminds us that death is not the final word, and that God never

abandons us, even in our darkest moments.

As we celebrate Easter, we are called to let go of sin and selfishness, and to embrace the new life and hope that Jesus offers. Meaning through Faith:

This message is just as important today as it was in the time of the early Christians. Sometimes, religion can become focused on ceremony and lose its true meaning. The Resurrection of Jesus is a powerful reminder of the transformative power of our faith.

The message of the empty tomb was initially confusing to the disciples. They couldn't understand where the body had gone and what had happened. However, when they were reminded of Jesus' words, the message began to make sense to them. Similarly, the experiences of our lives can sometimes be confusing and difficult to interpret without faith. We need to remember that, through the Resurrection, God has the power to transform our lives.

The early disciples were so energized by the shock of the Resurrection that nothing, not even death or persecution, could stop them from spreading the Good News. We too, as Christians, must be willing to hear the message of transformation and then spread it to others. We should not keep the Good News to ourselves, but share it with others so that they too can experience the joy and hope that comes from knowing Jesus.

So let us rejoice and be glad this Easter, as we celebrate the triumph of Jesus over sin and death. Let us give thanks to God for the gift of new life, and let us renew our commitment to follow Jesus, the risen Lord, wherever he may lead us. May the hope and joy of Easter fill our hearts and our lives, now and always.

Divine Mercy Sunday April 27, 2025



Divine Mercy Sunday, which falls on the Sunday after Easter, is one of the most powerful days in the Church's liturgical calendar. It's a day when the floodgates of God's mercy are opened in a special way, an opportunity to step away from distraction and draw near to the heart of Jesus.

1. Reflect on What Divine Mercy Sunday Is All About

Divine Mercy Sunday was established by Pope St. John Paul II and is rooted in the revelations given to St. Faustina Kowalska. Jesus made a remarkable promise: the soul who receives Communion in a state of grace on this day, having gone to Confession, will receive not only forgiveness of sins but the full remission of punishment. In short, it's a chance to begin again.

2. Make a Good Confession

Confession is at the heart of this devotion. Whether it's been a few weeks or a few years, this is the time to go. Prepare well. Be honest. Trust that Christ meets you there, not with condemnation, but with mercy. As Jesus told St. Faustina, "The greater the sinner, the greater the right he has to My mercy."

3. Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet Especially at 3:00 PM

The 3 o'clock hour when Christ died on the Cross is known as the Hour of Mercy. Jesus asked that we pause at this time to reflect on His Passion and to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet, even if only briefly. If you're able, set a reminder to stop and pray at 3 PM. It's a small habit that can bear much fruit.

4. Create Space for Prayer and Silence

If your schedule allows, carve out a little time this Sunday for quiet. No agenda. No expectations. Just a chance to sit with the Lord and let His mercy reach you. Bring your rosary, your journal, or simply your honest heart. Sometimes the most important thing we can do is simply show up.

5. Keep Sacred Reminders Close

Many people find it helpful to have physical reminders that ground their spiritual practices whether that's a rosary, a prayer booklet, or a medal of a saint who inspires them.

Final Encouragement

This Sunday is a gift. Don't let it slip by unnoticed. Whether your Lent went as planned or felt more like a struggle, Divine Mercy Sunday is a reminder that grace doesn't depend on our perfection, it depends on our willingness to trust.
